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## April 18<sup>th</sup> General Meeting Focussing on "Phytophthora" session

Parks Victoria have arranged for **Mr David Smith**, to be our guest presenter at our FoCC general meeting **7pm**, **Wednesday April 18th** at Earth Ed, Olympic Avenue, Mt Clear.

Our guest presenter, Mr David Smith is Forest Biosecurity Officer, Forest Pathologist, Entomologist and Chief Plant Health Officer Unit for Biosecurity, Agriculture, Food and Fibre in the Department of Economic Development, Jobs, Transport and Resources.

He will present on the threat "phytophthora" presents to the Parks well being.

The death of grass trees is an indicator that the disease may be present.

Phytophthora cinnamomi is a soil-borne water mould that produces an infection which causes a condition in plants called "root rot" or "dieback".

This presentation will offer the opportunity to hear first hand about the disease and its threat to the Park and what may be done.

Residents have formed the Sailors Gully Neighbourhood Committee to create plans for the beautification of the area, which member Stephen Pelchen said began with a clean up of litter.

"The first part of it is to do a clean up... then we can look at the next phases of what we do about beautifying the area, like putting some more native plants in, attracting more bird life and finding ways to make this whole estate look better than it is in a way that is natural and sustainable," he said.

"Some of those ideas might be to elevate the paths so they are out of the wet in winter, some of them get inundated and are flooded and unpassable by foot. We will look at ways at how we will present to council over the next few weeks."

#### Koalas under attack from developers again

Two development applications were posted recently in Canadian, both which seek to cut down Koala vegetation. The applications in Bennet St and the 600 block of Kline St claim that is no evidence that Koalas are resident or have been in the area, therefore developers should be able to remove the vegetation and put in more lots.

FoCC members attended a City of Ballarat mediation session about the development applications. They strongly put forward an expectation of adherence to the City's Koala planning laws and retention of Koala Habitat.

#### Mt Clear College Fire Ecology project

Mt Clear College's Earth Ed teachers have created a new course to teach students about Fire Ecology. The program works by having the students measure the conditions and fuel loads in the Woowookarung Regional Park. FoCC members assisted the program with a trial of the program,

#### Dark sky proposal

The view from the lookout in Woowookarung Regional Park of Ballarat's lights highlights a growing problem in our developed world. We are slowly losing our dark skies at night. In major cities many stars have simply dissappeared from view due to light pollution.

There is an international movement to protect the notion of a dark sky. The Friends believe that making Woowookarung Regional Park a dark sky reserve is a good idea. Darkness allows the flora and fauna to live in a natural landscape as well as allowing the Ballarat Observatory to maintain its observatory activities.

#### **Dementia trail**

A proposal by the Ballarat office of Dementia Australia to construct a dementia friendly walking and experience trail in Woowookarung Regional Park has been successfully awarded \$15000 by Dementia Friendly Communities.

This is great news for the Park and very helpful for people living with Dementia and their carers to experience, smell and feel the natural environment in a safe and easily accessable trail environment.

The likely site for the trail is for an entrance and car park on Katy Ryans Rd just inside the Park boundary. The project will take some time to plan and organise.

#### **Bio diversity application**

The FoCC committee has prepared an application for a grant from DEWLP to remove gorse and broom weeds and revegetate with Koala and woodland bird trees and shrubs an area of 5.7 hecatres of land adjacent to Katy Ryans Rd.

The site links two remnant koala habitat vegetation islands in the centre of Woowookarung Regional Park.



#### **Mudhole filling**

Parks Victoria rangers have been active in organising the removal of mud holes from tracks. Removing a mud hole removes the so called challenge for 4WD drivers to "beat the hole". This former mud hole is located at the south west corner of the planned revegetation area



#### **Burnt Cars again**

Another burnt car just off Wilson St Ballarat East near the cnr of Boundary Rd. The resulting fire burnt a large area around the vehicle and required CFA attendance and Parks Victoria ranger patrolling overnight.



## **Golden Nugget tours**

Woowookarung Regional Park now has a Parks Victoria registered tourist operator offering walks, tours and nightime experiences in the Park.

The Nightime experience may involve using spotlights to highlight animals in the Park.


