
1. <u>Woowookarung Regional Park Bird Count and the</u> <u>Great Australian Backyard Bird Count</u>

BirdLife Australia's Backyard Bird Count is happening soon, **October 19-25**th and the FoCC is encouraging members to participate and support this activity. You can check out information about this research, education and conservation program <u>https://aussiebirdcount.org.au/</u> The App is great to use to complete a 20 minute survey and it has an excellent Field Guide so you can more easily identify the birds you see.


FoCC is also monitoring approximately 13 sites across Woowookarung Park (see map). We invite any keen birders to join in, and so during the week visit one or more of the sites and do the bird count. Dementia trail tree planting

A Parks Victoria led tree planting team have planted many hundreds of trees on the outer boundaries of the Dementia Trail. The team also cleared a significant amount of dead pine trees from the area.

Extra plantings have been placed on a closed vehicle track along Bakers Rd and Katy Ryans Rd.

The trees were propagated by Ballarat Group Training students and cared for over the winter by wonderful volunteers.

Feral tree removal.



Vehicle access off Boundary Rd to the 4WD trail down to Lal Lal Drain has been closed by Parks Victoria contractors. The former forestry track runs along the eastern boundary of the Park and is quite steep and is a popular walking and cycling path. The removal of vehicle access will allow the track to be kept in good order for recreation purposes only.

5. 55 Recreation Road update

FoCC's request to the City of Ballarat and the Victorian Schools Building Authority to transfer the land at 55 Recreation Rd to the Council to allow for the establishment of the 'Bunny Trail" is moving slowly forward.

Our understanding is the land is currently being valued by the State Valuer General as part of the process.

A new development is the idea of re-routing the Goldfields Track cycle track from the Mt Clear roundabout, east along Recreation Rd to 55 Rec Rd and exiting via the Bunny trail into the Park, then following tracks thru to Bailey Rd and connecting with Goldfields Walk Track at the Amphitheatre. At present the cycle trail goes south from Mt Clear roundabout and is a mess of traffic lights and crossings.

6. Fire in the top block opposite the Lookout

A fire occurred on Sunday September 6th on the top block opposite the lookout. On the day there was a strong warm north wind blowing. Perhaps a salutary warning of a summer to come.

The CFA and Forest Fire Management Victoria attended the fire. A bull dozer was used to encircle the fire and then contain it.

10. FoCC tree planting completed

FoCC was unable to host a community-based tree planting this year due to Covid 19 restrictions.

The friends did hold a tree guard and stake pick in July where 500 tree guards and 1500 stakes were collected from the previous year's plantings and prepared for recycling. However, for this year the trees in tube stock form had been grown by the wonderful folk at the Cities tree nursery and were waiting for a home.

To solve the problem the FoCC committee contracted Pat from Gurks Gardening to plant the 500 trees in the Corridor on the east side of Dozed Rd.

The trees are now in place and nature has provided very timely rains to provide a great start.

The proposed pop up wildflower walk in late October will visit the trees a part of the circuit.





12. Small group park clean-up proposed for Oct 11th

With the relaxing of Covid 19 restrictions FoCC is planning a rubbish clean-up and pine tree seedling pull on the W block just south of Katy Ryans Rd. The clean-up is waiting upon approval from Parks Vic and will be preparation for the anticipated pop up Wildflower Walk which is scheduled now for the week of October 25 to October 31st.

13. Wildflower Pop Up Walk.

FoCC in partnership with the Field Naturalists Club of Ballarat (FNCB) has run a pop-up wildflower walk for several years now.

The 2020 walk is planned to happen on October 25th to 31st without the big formal group walk at the start with FNCB's knowledgeable guides. This year the trail will be set up and people will be able to attend in small numbers and with plenty of room for social distancing to do the walk safely. The expected site will be off Katy Ryans Road. More details as soon as possible.

14. 846 Eureka St objection

FoCC is an objector to a development at 846 Eureka St. The site features a degraded but open creek and some Koala habitat.

At first the usual developer's application was to pipe the creek, clear the trees and put as many saleable blocks on it as possible.

Very good work by the Cities statutory planner with the floodplain managers at the Corangamite Catchment Management Authority (CCMA), coupled with a more enlightened drainage consultant has produced a plan which is almost there. Note: Works on creeks must have a permit from the CCMA.

The creek is to remain open and the Koala habitat is to be placed into a reserve on the east side.

FoCC is waiting on a landscape plan for the creek, revisions of the culvert and creek design across Long St and some final flood calculations before being able to accept the plan. A small group of local residents are also involved in this objection.

The outcome we hope to see is an open creek, landscaped and a feature of the estate.

Stop Press: An amended much improved creek, road crossing, reserve and landscape plan has been just received. More to come.

15. <u>4WD damage</u>

Wet areas of the Park seem to be a magnet to unthinking 4WD's. The wet area west of the intersection of Dozed Rd and Katy Ryans Rd has seen a number of bogged 4WD this winter. The extraction of the vehicles creates a bigger mess on the land.
