1. 55 Recreation Road

City of Ballarat decides to purchase 55 Recreation Road.

On Wednesday February 24th 2021 the City of Ballarat council voted unanimously to:

"to give the CEO authority to negotiate the purchase of unused state government land to complete the so-called Bunny Rail Trail, a cycling and walking path linking Ballarat East to Woowookarung Regional Park."

A community dream of one continuous trail connecting the Bunny Trail in Ballarat's east could come a step closer to reality if council pushes ahead with buying surplus state government land.

Ballarat City council will be voting on the purchase of the block of land in Mount Clear for the new linking trail at this Wednesday's council meeting.



5. Koala monitoring continues

FoCC volunteers were busy looking for Koala scat in Woowookarung Regional Park on Friday 26th of February as part of the University of Melbourne research project. 6. Deceased Koala follow up

The August 2020 Spikey News reported a little Koala found dead near the corner of Foos Lane and Boundary Road. An Autopsy short report has been sent to the FoCC noting the Koala died some-time after sustaining injuries consistent with falling from a tree or hit by a car.

Boundary Road has a speed limit of 100kph along the edge of the Park. One of the FoCC wishes, is for speed limits to be placed on all 22 Council Roads that intersect or pass through the Forest and Park.


7. The Trial Sawmill and Tramway

A "Trial Sawmill" was established in 1855 on the north-east slope of Mount Buninyong following the awarding of a government contract to provide sawn planks for a wooden road between Ballarat and Meredith.

The mill was built on the side of the mount near a permanent water supply at the base of several gullies. The mill itself was a two-storied structure, 30 by 14 metres, with the ground floor housing the engine and offices and the top floor the saw benches, which comprised two vertical and two circular saws. Logs were drawn up to the bench floor by means of an inclined tramway worked by a rope. Some 30 cubic metres were cut each working day. This colossal tally was due to the mill exclusively cutting long length thick planks rather than smaller building timbers.

Around the mill were the stables, chaff shed, blacksmith, carpenter, wheelwright shop, veterinary forge, offices and the manager's house. The workforce numbered around fifty persons. Logs were hauled in by bullock teams and the sawn timber initially sent away in horse drawn carts. During the first winter the outlet track became impassable, so an eight km length of tramway was laid down between the mill and the main Buninyong to Ballarat Road at Green Hills."

Remnants of the tramway were still evident in 1998 according to Evans, with a 400m raised earth section still apparent just north of Yendon Number 1 Road.

The Woowookarung Regional Park has several hills within and adjacent to it.


Named hills are:

- 9. Conglomerate Hill

9. Recreation Road issues

Recreation Road is heavily used as bypass by many varied vehicles. The image below shows an unsafe passage of a truck squeezing a car near the Water Tanks.

Recreation Road needs a well thought out plan to allow wildlife to cross safely, cyclists to ride safely on the road

and for vehicles to transit safely. FoCC traffic surveys last year recorded large numbers of commercial vehicles using the road and many more passenger and tradie vehicles travelling at unsafe speeds.

The plan should include cycle and wildlife crossings and a "Park speed limit".

10. Wildlife nest boxes

A letter received by the FoCC recently with useful information for any landholders wishing to assist birdlife and small animal life.

Hi FOCC

I'm Miles Geldard and I have been making nest boxes for native wildlife for about 20 years. I design my nest boxes from peer reviewed ecological research studies and extensive field trials. They're built to last and constructed from quality local sustainable materials.

Recently I installed a dozen nest boxes in a property neighbouring your patch of forest and the property owner expressed an enthusiasm for me to approach your group and offer my services from the list below. I am from Castlemaine area so would be guided by your local knowledge on things if you choose to proceed but I am happy to help.

I also include a 'bee treatment' that prevents swarming honey bees form invading the boxes. It is chemical free, maintenance free and lasts forever.

11. Grasstree Creek

Grasstree Creek runs from Joseph St in Canadian, in an easterly direction through Sparrow Ground, via Cherry and Boyd Courts before emerging at Fussell St where it runs through open land before entering the Woowookarung Regional Park at the corner of Long St and Spencer St. The creek continues on easterly direction into Woowookarung Regional Park through to its head just east of Boundary Road.

Grasstree Creek was named in 2013 by the City of Ballarat after representations from the Friends of Sparrow Ground. The naming was celebrated in 2013 with a ribbon cutting by local ward Councillor Des Hudson.

"Grasstree Creek"

Grasstree Creek was named in the Victorian Government Gazette on September 12th 2013 and after 30 days the name became official on October 12th 2013.

The naming follows a long process that began in May 2011 when the Friends applied to name the creek running through Sparrow Ground. At that time there was some confusion about the creeks name with the "Pennyweight Gully" walking track running through Sparrow Ground. However the truth is that the real Pennyweight Gully runs from Canadian Lead School through the Canadian Springs Estate and on through the Southern part of Pax Hill Scout

The name "Grasstree Creek comes from the numerous Grasstrees in its catchment area and within Sparrow Ground. Naming of the creek should provide improved prominence in our community as well as permanent protection from unauthorised works.

How Grasstree Creek got its name:

In 2013 the Friends of Sparrow Ground nominated four names for the creek:

They were

 Grass Tree creek – Grass trees form the understory in the head waters in the (then) Canadian forest. They

- are in Sparrow Ground and would have been in cleared areas originally.
- Xanthorrhoea creek
- Wadawurrung peoples name for "grass tree" creek.
- An appropriate mining or historical name. As Pennyweight Gully and Specimen Vale creeks are named.

Ballarat East local area plan and Grasstree Creek

In January 20 2018 the FoCC responded to the city of Ballarat "Imagine Ballarat East" Directions Paper, by identifying the following:

Trail B: A trail along Spencer St to the corner of Long St and Spencer St and then east along a cycle path beside Grass Tree creek through the Park until the Boundary Rd is reached. This trail passes the northern boundary of Pax Hill Scout Camp on Spencer St.

The FoCC also submitted that the "The Grasstree Creek trail is wrongly named as the Pennyweight Gully (trail) in its upper reaches beyond Joseph St. "

12. Grasstree Creek Trail

The Grasstree Creek trail runs from Joseph St, Canadian eastwards through Sparrow Ground, Cherry court and Boyd Court before emerging at Fussell St where it runs through open land before entering the Woowookarung Regional Park at the corner of Long St and Spencer St.
