## Dementia Friendly Forest and Sensory <u>Trail</u> passes 1000 visitors

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#### 1. Dementia Friendly Forest and Sensory Trail

Over 1000 visitors have walked the Dementia Trail in the first three weeks since the opening on June 25. Whilst the trail is open and visitors are enjoying the thoughtful features, the stopping points and the clever ways of seeing the adjacent forest, there are still some works yet to be completed.

At the east end of the trail a Board Walk is to be constructed. Once winter is over a final surface will be applied to the pathways.

Finally, the provision of a better formed path to connect the end of the trail to the Lookout trail will hopefully be on the works list soon.

#### 3. Tree Planting August 8<sup>th</sup>

The FoCC will hold a planting of 500 trees in the Katy Ryans Rd area on Sunday and Monday August 9<sup>th</sup> 2021.

The trees are supplied by the wonderful people at the City of Ballarat Community Nursery. The trees are propagated using locally sourced seed.

The tree planting will be held over three sessions to allow for Covid restrictions (The easing of lockdown now allows 10 participants per session).

#### 7. Flora and Fauna Guarantee 2021

The 2021 Flora and Fauna Guarantee list recently released has identified three Woowookarung species as critically endangered, endangered and vulnerable. An additional species Brookers Gum exists in the Corridor.

- 1. Yarra gum (Eucalyptus yarraensis) critically endangered species. It is a poorly known species whose distribution appears to have been much fragmented by the clearing of the natural habitat. It is distinguished from E. ovata by the completely rough bark and smaller leaves, buds and fruits. Yarra Gums may be found in the Park at the end of Lavery Avenue and near the corner of Dozed Rd and Katy Ryans Rd.
- 2. Penny leaf flat pea (Platylobium rotundum) is endangered. There are just four locations of this pea in the Park.

- 3. **Powerful Owl** (Ninox strenua) is listed as *vulnerable*. There is a breeding pair adjacent to the Park.
- Brookers Gum (Eucalyptus brookeriana) which is endangered. There are isolated specimens of Brookers Gum near the railway line on Warrenheip Bank and behind the Brewery Tap hotel in Warrenheip.



#### 9. 55 Recreation Rd Bushland Reserve update.

In November 2019 the FoCC identified the potential for a connector "Bunny" trail between Recreation Rd and the Park along the disused Bunny Railway line embankment at 55 Recreation Rd Mt Clear.

FoCC has been notified that the City of Ballarat and Victorian Government have now agreed to a transfer process and the administrative detail and contracts are now in progress.

#### 10. Wet weather and uncontrolled access to tracks.

The recent wet weather has been a boon to the flora of the Park. Plants are having a field day in wet conditions. The downside is that off road vehicles make a bigger mess than usual when travelling on unmade roads in the Park.

#### 11. Park Works

Bit by bit Parks Victoria personnel are restoring, protecting and managing the Park.

Recently understory plantings were made along the Nature Trail. The plantings shown below are on an old downhill

eroded section of track which was in use before the nature trail was built. The new trail has a gentler slope and water runoffs. Plantings complete the repair works. Now it is up to nature!!

#### 12. Park planned burns 2021 -2023

Forest Fire Management Victoria has published the schedule of planned burns for 2021 through to 2023. Legend:

Fuel reduction 2021/2	60 hectares
Fuel Reduction 2023	28 hectares
Grass and shrub slashing	6.5 km

The planned fuel reduction south of Recreation Rd is on a mixture of forest and ex plantation land. The re growth on the ex-plantation land is here is now nine years old and includes a lot of weeds. Recently FFV have used the Eco blade machine to remove broom from the regrowth area.

#### 13. Hoon behavior

Hoon behaviour is an all too often occurrence in the Park. Recently friends have been reporting number of trees pushed over along the Parks roads. Most appear to be deliberate as the image below illustrates.

#### 15. Walking/cycling trail loop

There are around 200 km of roads, tracks and trails in the Park. The new Dementia and the Nature Trail provide the basis of an easy walk/cycle through the centre of the Park.



The trail is 7.31 kilometres long, starting and finishing at the Dementia Trail car park. Part of the trail from the end of the Nature Trail to the car park is along unmade bush tracks. Good footwear and clothing are recommended.

#### 16. Spotted in the Park

The post gold story of the Park involves a lot of wood cutting with the forest cut many times over, beginning with mine props in the 1860's to household firewood lots in the 1950's. The axe head relic tells a story!

#### 17. New signs in the Sanctuary Mt Helen.

#### Start on Signage

"Ballarat City Council has installed the first of three signs delineating the Sanctuary Bushland Reserve at Mt Helen.

The Sanctuary reserve was developed as a result of a VCAT determination that, while permitting housing in the 'estate' area, a bushland corridor had to be retained as safe koala habitat. The estate is covered by four environmental overlays, and VCAT further mandated that there were to be no cats or dogs kept on any lot.

Nearby residents are urged not to throw any garden refuse (including grass clippings) into the Sanctuary. There is already evidence of gorse, broom and blackberry problems. Council has received a request for regular weed eradication to follow up on work started late last year. The Sanctuary reserve is a peaceful and significantly vegetated piece of retained bush. There have been 56 species of plants identified within its boundaries"
