
This is the sixth mass tree planting by the FoCC since 2017. The trees are supplied by the wonderful people at the City of Ballarat Community Nursery. The trees are propagated using locally sourced seed.




Meet Point. Signs from Elsworth St.

#### 3. Past tree plantings

The FOCC began planting trees in Woowookarung RP in 2017 and so far, have planted 2800 trees, mostly eucalyptus in the area around Katy Ryans Rd. All the tree seeds were sourced within the Park and propagated by the wonderful people at the City of Ballarat Community Nursery.

The nursery was established following a recommendation from the 2006 City of Ballarat Koala Plan of Management.



The map above shows the location of the past five tree plantings. The purpose behind the plantings is to connect pockets of remnant vegetation left behind after the blue gum plantation was removed. The plantings support a North South fauna corridor running from the centre of the Park down to the existing forest on the north side of Recreation Road.

#### 4. Bird of the month XI (July 2022)

#### White-winged Chough (Corcorax melanoramphos)

I know what you're thinking. A largeish, (almost entirely) black bird that feeds on the ground, in groups. It must be a raven, right? Wrong! Don't be fooled – these busy, gregarious, forest-floor foragers are choughs (pronounced 'chuff'), and they belong to the 'Australian Mud-nesters' Corcoracidae family.

Choughs can be distinguished from ravens by their titular white wing patches (which are inconspicuous or hidden when the wing is folded, i.e. only revealed in flight), curved bill, and red eye. If they are too distant to discern finer details, some other cues to rule out a raven are a strut with back-and-forth head movement; tail bobbing (up and down); short, low flights of flapping culminating in a flat-

winged glide to a perch; and calls that range from piping whistles, to small throaty clicks, and a raspy 'hass' or 'chzark'.

Highly sociable, White-winged Choughs are almost invariably found in parties, ranging from 4-20 individuals, and sometimes more during non-breeding season. Flocks are territorial, and typically consist of a breeding pair, and non-breeding 'helpers' which are often offspring from previous broods.

White-winged Choughs reach sexual maturity at four years of age, which means the breeding pair would have another three years' worth of broods before their first brood possibly relinquishes helper duties (i.e. nest building, egg incubation, and feeding young) should they leave the parents' flock. Given females lay clutches of usually 3-5 eggs but as many 9 per brood (once a year) – as you can imagine that is a lot of mouths to feed, and a lot of helpers! Males and females are identical, while juveniles are dusky dark brown, and have orange eyes.

As previously alluded to, White-winged Choughs construct nests of mud. This large, deep bowl of mud may be reinforced with bark, grass, fur, and even the manure of cattle or Emus! Nests are positioned on a horizontal branch 6-15m off the ground. The availability of mud – for nest building – may influence White-winged Choughs to gravitate to wetter areas of open woodland and forest, but they are also known to frequent higher and drier areas too. Since they probe and scratch about the forest floor – often in spread-out formation – for their food of insects and seeds, an abundance of leaf litter is a requirement of any habitat selected.

Quite the cheeky rascals, White-winged Choughs may get up to such unruly antics as kidnapping young from rival chough flocks; other females laying eggs in the breeding pair's nest (way to break rank!); and indulging in dust baths and 'anting' which entails laying on an ants' nest with wings sprawled out to invite ants to eat away any bothersome parasites. Mischievous and clever!

Next time you wander through Woowookarung Regional Park, or another local forest patch, keep an eye out for flocks of these busy, strutting forest floor foragers – and if you find some, won't you be chuffed!

#### Working bee July 24<sup>th</sup>

The FoCC hosted a tree stake and guard collection on Sunday July 24<sup>th</sup> 2022. A dozen volunteers picked up 1800 stakes and 600 tree guards from the area planted in 2020. The stakes and guards were sorted and stored for reuse in the next planting.

Observation of the 2020 planting was that about 75% of the plantings survived, which is a very good rate.

#### 7. 55 Recreation Road Reserve Update

The FoCC committee is currently working through the establishment of the trail across 55 Recreation Rd Reserve. The creation of a legal trail easement across private land to connect the reserve to the Park is underway with a survey and associated legal work.

Later in the year there will be some working bees to remove pine saplings and to prepare for revegetation.

**Tree planting**. Parks Vic have completed a new tree planting near the corner of Olympic Av and Boundary Rd. 250 trees were planted by Ballarat Group Training (BGT) students over the past weeks.


BGT have been involved in several tree planting and associated works in Park, beginning with plantings in the Dementia Trail area and more recently near the top of Katy Ryans Rd and the Cathie St Car Park.

Pine tree removal occurred in the Richards St block which is located between Richards St and Clayton St and runs along the northern boundary of the Rifle Range. The block contains remnants of "Quigleys Hut" and the summit of Sinclair Hill. More information on Quigleys Hut can be found in the June 2020 Issue 69 edition of Spikey News. Prior to the pine removal a gorse and broom removal spray program was applied earlier in the year.

Last year Parks Vic placed bollards at each end of a track through the block to curtail rubbish dumpers and firewood thieves.

#### 10. Gold fossicking

Gold fossicking is an approved activity in Woowookarung Regional Park.

To fossick in the Park requires a miner's right for over 18 year olds.

Simple rules according to earth resources are:

- Drive vehicles on tracks or roads open to the public and park your vehicles on the roadside.
- Do not bury rubbish. Take it home or put it in a bin if provided.
- Minimise any damage to vegetation including the ground layer.
- Immediately restore the area to how you found it, i.e. backfill any holes you dig and replace leaf litter.

However, someone has been digging fossicking holes in tracks in the north end of the Park and leaving them unfilled. Some of the holes have tree roots exposed. About a dozen holes were found on and beside tracks. Thanks to the friends who have been filling them in.

#### 11. Tree ID slow walk August 28th 2022

A slow walk looking at the many different species of trees in the centre of the Park will be held on **August 28**th **2022**. Meeting point is the Dementia Trail car park at 10 am. Good walking footwear, warm clothing and water are essential. The distance to be walked is around 6km. Knowledgeable local naturalists will lead the walk and highlight the array of species in the Park along the way. The walk will encompass the Dementia Trail, Lal Lal Drain, The Lookout and Bakers Rd on the return.

#### 12. Another development proposal Mt Clear

There is a new two-lot subdivision development proposal at 46 Lavery Avenue.

The FoCC had been involved in a previous proposal for a two-lot subdivision in 2017. At that time the FoCC was supportive of the proposal as it involved no loss of vegetation. The subdivision did not occur.

The FoCC has some concerns about this latest proposal as it requires the destruction of 25 koala habitat trees.

Removing 25 Koala habitat trees from the land to facilitate the proposed building envelopes contravenes the purpose of the Koala Plan of Management. Removal of the vegetation means the application fails to address the Koala Plan, Clause 22.04-3 Buildings and works requirements dot point 1:

"the removal of koala habitat may be approved for the purpose of constructing buildings and associated works within a defined building envelope/works area only if the applicant can demonstrate that:

"The building envelope/works area cannot be located elsewhere on-site to avoid and/or minimise the need for removal of native vegetation within areas of koala habitat"

There is plenty of room to save the trees by reworking the building envelope.



Changing the building envelope would reduce the conflict between surrounding trees and envelope. Relocation, rotation and a change of shape could be part of the resolution.

#### 13. Antechinus in nest box

Antechinus droppings (scat) have been spotted in nest boxes in the Katy Ryans and Bakers Rd area.

Antechinus are:

Antechinus (/æntɪˈkaɪnəs/ ('ant-echinus')) is a genus of small dasyurid marsupial endemic to Australia. They resemble mice with the bristly fur of shrews.

Antechinus were spotted a year ago in a nearby wood heap and on a path in the Park. Antechinus are small mice-like marsupials. Fallen trees and logs provide excellent habitat for antechinus.

#### 14. Indigent Asylum for Old Colonists of Victoria

Some clever work by Carlo has uncovered a planned "Indigent Asylum" for Old Colonists of Victoria. Indigent means "poor or needy." The Government Gazette of 12<sup>th</sup> October 1891 has the following notice:

### LANDS TEMPORARILY RESERVED FROM SALE, ETC.

N pursuance of the provisions of the Land Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1106, § 10 and 13): Notice is hereby given that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has reserved, temporarily, from sale and leasing, and from having a licence granted in respect thereof, and has also (unless where otherwise stated) excepted from occupation for mining purposes or for residence or business and the land of the Land of 1890 afore and, the lands hereinafter described, viz.:—

Pursuant to Orders of 12 October, 1891.

Ballaarat (Mount Clear).—Site for an Asylum for Indigent Members of the Old Colonists' Association of Ballaarat, also excepted from occupation for mining purposes, or for residence or business under any miner's right or business licence.—Twenty-eight acres one rood thirty-six perches, county of Grant, parish of Ballaarat: Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 1 of section 4A'; bounded thence by that allotment bearing N. 0° 18' W. three chains seventy-four links; thence by the Railway Reserve bearing north-westerly fourteen chains sixty-one links in an arc of a circle whose centre lies forty-one chains fifty links easterly; thence by lines bearing respectively N. 79° 6' W. fourteen chains and S. 7° 20' E. twenty-one chains sixty-eight links; and thence by a road bearing S. 79° 31' E. one chain fifteen links and N. 84° 13' E. fourteen chains seventeen links to the point of commencement.—(B.1266) (91.A.12871).




The map below is an approximation of the site. The asylum was never built.

#### 18. Elsworth St and Katy Ryans Rd Kangaroo population

There is a need for fauna warning signs and a 40 kph speed limit along those sections of the road east of Butt St to protect the mob as well as motorists.
