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#### 1. Many errors in claims by Developer in Mt Clear.

An amended "Biodiversity Assessment" for a proposed 27 lot residential subdivision at 43 Haymes Road, Mount Clear, Victoria" contains plans to destroy 2.9 hectares of Koala habitat and remove 13 critically endangered Yarra Gums in a report published on the City of Ballarat E Planning applications website. This is up from the 2.7 hectares of destruction proposed in the first assessment published in March this year.

The proposed removal of the Yarra Gums would reduce by one third the number of Yarra Gums that actually exist in the Canadian Corridor according to the maps published in the report. The property contains the largest concentration of Yarra Gums in the Corridor.

The Courier reported: "the potential ecological impact on koalas and other endangered species visited by a large subdivision in Mount Clear would be minimal according to a report commissioned by the developer".


The report claims that the Koala habitat is not valuable and that "no koalas" were recorded there on their <u>one-day</u> visit This shows that the "biodiversity assessment" was not based on actual local observation or recorded facts. The assessment authors did not speak to any knowledgeable locals

A Sugar Glider rescued was by local wildlife carers at the rear of a Kylie Court property. The sugar glider was released back into its home vegetation after receiving care. The property butts onto the Haymes Rd property. The sugar glider would have been resident in the extensive vegetation east of Kylie Court. Sugar gliders utilise old mature tree hollows. The proposed development not only would destroy Koala habitat but the habitat of these little sugar gliders also.

#### 2. 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Wildflower Walk

Yes folks, the seventh annual wildflower walk will be on **October 23**<sup>th</sup> **to October 30**<sup>th</sup> along the Dementia Forest and Sensory Trail.

The Field Naturalists Club of Ballarat and the FoCC have organised the self-guided pop-up wild flower trail walk in the central part of the Woowookarung Regional Park beginning on Sunday Oct 23rd at 11am.

The walking trail start point is from the Car Park at the Dementia Friendly Forest and Sensory Trail on Katy Ryans Rd. Direction signs will be on Elsworth St.

Signs will identify the start and the path will be marked with wildflower information signs to identify the diverse range of wildflowers.



The walking trail is a gentle walk uphill on formed track. Good footwear is recommended.

#### 3. Minister release State Water Strategy

The Hon Harriet Shing Minister for Water released the State Water Strategy via DELWP on Sept 5<sup>th</sup> 2022.


One priority listed in the strategy is one that supports the FoCC's interest in the protection and restoration of Little Creeks.

The report says:

4.4 Provide funding for priority actions in the *Yarrowee River and Tributaries: River Corridor Master Plan* to ensure the parklands can cater to the recreational needs of the growing community while balancing the protection of cultural and environmental values and restoring habitat.

This is vindication of the FoCC's request made to the City of Ballarat in the August 12th 2020 online meeting where the FoCC succeeded in convincing the Council to include the additional six extra little creeks in addition to the four named creeks in the Canadian Creek basin.

The creeks covered under the "tributaries" are:

## 4. Bird of the Month XIII (September 2022) Powerful Owl (Ninox strenua)

At FoCC, we are passionate about all native species, but we make no secret of our fondness of the Powerful Owl. 'Endangered' in Victoria, Powerful Owls are a prized local rarity in The Corridor. Confirmed presence of Powerful Owl is grounds to abort developments in the sites they occupy, such is their rareness and need to be protected. Endemic to south-east Australia (i.e. occur exclusively, found nowhere), Powerful Owls occupy territories yearround, within forests and woodlands.

Powerful Owls require large hollows for breeding success. For hollows to be suitable, the gumtree must be aged 150-500 years old! Habitat loss and diminishing availability of hollows suitable for nesting are major threats to Powerful Owl survival, along with second hand rodenticide poisoning, and collisions with vehicles and powerlines.

Breeding season is from April–September. Breeding pairs mate for life (up to 30 years). The sexes look alike, but males are larger and have a boxier head than females. The male prepares and defends the nest, while the female incubates a clutch of 1-2 eggs, and feeds hatchlings food delivered by the male. Juveniles have more white throughout their plumage than adults, as they progressively moult their white downy feathers. At around 6-7 months old, juvenile Powerful Owls look identical to adults, but remain dependent on their parents — listening for their begging trills is the only way to distinguish them from their

parents. Offspring may remain in the parents' territory for over a year.

#### HAVE YOU SEEN THIS BIRD???

Powerful Owl, Endangered, answers to 'Powl'

Last seen Oct 21st 2021 in the Mt Helen area

Appearance: thick-set (66cm; 1.5m wingspan); dark grey-brown head & upperparts; chevron-patterned breast; eye mask; massive, yellow feet



Voice: Deep, loud 'whoo-hoo', heard up to 2km away

Possible whereabouts: Forests with large hollows, abundant prey (e.g. possums) & sheltered roost sites of gumtrees, pines, or Blackwoods

Urgent: Vulnerable to habitat loss & hollow shortage, secondhand rodenticide poisoning, collisions with vehicles & powerlines

Good Samaritan: Its predation of possums prevents overpopulation of prey, which limits tree damage by over-browsing of vegetation

Detective clues: trace evidence beneath roost site, include whitewash (poo, looks like splashed paint), regurgitated pellets (looks like vacuum dust balls, containing fur & feathers) & discarded prey remains

As Australia's largest owl, and true to their name, Powerful Owls are the only bird in Australia capable of taking flight with prey heavier than itself in tow. Prey can be as large as cat-sized Common Brushtail Possum and even subadult Koalas! Arboreal (i.e. tree-dwelling) mammals, e.g. Common Ringtail Possum, brushtails, and Sugar Gliders tend to be favoured, while Black Rats (introduced), and birds are also commonly preyed upon. Powerful Owls, as a top-order predator, are ecologically important for the role they play in keeping prey populations from proliferating into overpopulation.

Next time you contemplate a day stroll through local bushland, perhaps defer it until the evening, and listen out for the 'whoo-hoo' utterings of this awe-inspiring owl. #### 5. <u>Backyard Bird Count</u>




# The <u>Aussie Backyard Bird Count</u> is back OCTOBER 17-23 2022.

Sean Dooley at the FoCC birds forum spoke about leaving fallen litter and limbs on the ground as habitat for woodland birds to forage for insects and grubs.

#### First Working Bee at 55 Recreation Road

A working bee has been organised to remove small pine saplings from the bushland reserve at 55 Recreation Rd. Work involves cutting pine saplings with long handled secateurs or handsaws. Good physical stamina as the saplings must be cut at ground level to stop regrowth. Solid footwear and clothing essential.

The removal of the saplings will allow the native understory to regenerate.
